OVERVIEW OF OUR WORK FOR THE YEAR TO JUNE 2025

OUR CORE WORKSTREAMS AND HIGHLIGHTS

We are pleased to be able to share this year's activities in the pages that follow. Here is an overview of the main areas of work undertaken by Tangata Tiriti – Treaty People in the financial year from July 2024 to June 2025.

This report starts with our flagship Te Tiriti in our Language (TiOL) programme, which this year boasts a number of [national 'firsts' for workshop delivery in different languages](#) including Kinyarwanda, Somali, Swahili and Punjabi. As well as Waikato firsts with Dari, Spanish and Mandarin Chinese.

Congratulations to all the facilitators who took the significant step of bringing Te Tiriti education to their communities in their native languages.

The [delivery of workshops to client organisations](#) grew this year both in terms of the number of workshops booked and as a proportion of our overall workload. Paying clients made up [50% of the workshop time](#) during this period. We would like to acknowledge organisations such as Ka Puta Ka Ora and Tātaki Auckland Unlimited who book our workshops for their staff on an ongoing basis.

The [Treaty Principles Bill](#) created demand for speaking engagements and clear information about the proposed legislation as communities rallied to understand and respond to political developments. We responded to these requests by creating a *Simple Guide to the Principles of the Treaty of Waitangi Bill* in English, Spanish and Arabic and by speaking at public events.

The calendar year started with a huge effort by our packing team to send out [resources in 25x languages](#) in time for Waitangi Day 2025. They also packed resources for stalls run by both our members and other Tiriti groups around the country. Waitangi Day itself was our busiest yet with activations at four separate locations at the same time. We took on the rental of two [office and storage spaces](#) in our home regions of Auckland and Waikato to cope with the needs of resource distribution.

Finally, in May our National Coordinator Dr Ingrid Huygens was [inducted into the New Zealand Order of Merit](#) this year and was recognised for a lifetime of service to Māori and to Education.

TE TIRITI IN OUR LANGUAGE WORKSHOP DELIVERY

A NUMBER OF LANGUAGE FIRSTS!

At the close of last year's reporting period, we had just hosted an upskilling training for our multilingual facilitators in the Waikato. Over this year, we have continued to support these facilitators to deliver their first workshops in their native languages to their own communities.

We are proud to be able to list a number of 'firsts' in this year's workshop delivery by our community facilitators in the Waikato:

- First workshop in Somali language with the Somali Friendship Society (July 2024)
- First workshops in Spanish in the Waikato (June & Aug 2024)
- First workshop with the Afar community (Aug 2024)
- First workshop in Mandarin Chinese in the Waikato (Oct 2024)
- First Dari language workshop in the Waikato (Oct 2024)
- First workshop in Kinyarwanda with the Congolese Community (Oct 2024)
- First workshop in Punjabi (Oct 2024)
- First workshop in Swahili (May 2025)

PARTNERING WITH WELCOMING COMMUNITIES

Welcoming Communities has again been an important partner for us, sponsoring workshops for newcomers in a number of regions.

During Welcoming Week in September 2024, we offered full-day workshops in Tauranga and Hamilton, and later workshops in Christchurch and Queenstown, all in partnership with Welcoming Communities.

In Tāmaki, we delivered a total of nine workshops across the five participating local board areas. These included half-day workshops at public libraries, a large workshop for Chinese Seniors and a workshop for Spanish speakers together with Mano Amiga.

CONNECTING COMMUNITIES WITH TANGATA WHENUA

WORKSHOPS ON MARAE

Participants of marae-based workshops are able to experience a pōwhiri, often for the first time, hear kōrero about the wharenuī and experience manaakitanga in the wharekai. Marae offer rich visual and aural learnings about the local histories and cultural context of the home people and a chance for communities to connect directly with mana whenua.

Two of our generous long-term hosts in the Waikato are Hukanui Marae and Aratiatia Marae.

HAPŪ HISTORIES IN TĀMAKI MAKAUURAU

We continue to work with Dane Tumahai of Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei, who shares a guided experience titled 'Survialism to Thrivalism' with groups of manuhiri. Our team coordinates the groups and drives the van as we travel to three significant Ngāti Whātua sites.

WORKSHOP DELIVERY WITH PAYING CLIENTS

COMMUNITY, PUBLIC & NOT FOR PROFIT SECTOR WORKSHOPS

We also offer subsidised training for staff and volunteers from community-sector organisations. These groups will often open up registrations to their wider networks, giving staff in small organisations the opportunity to upskill on Te Tiriti o Waitangi together with their peers.

We also work with a number of community groups who sponsor workshops for members of the public, wanting to increase the understanding of Te Tiriti within their local communities.

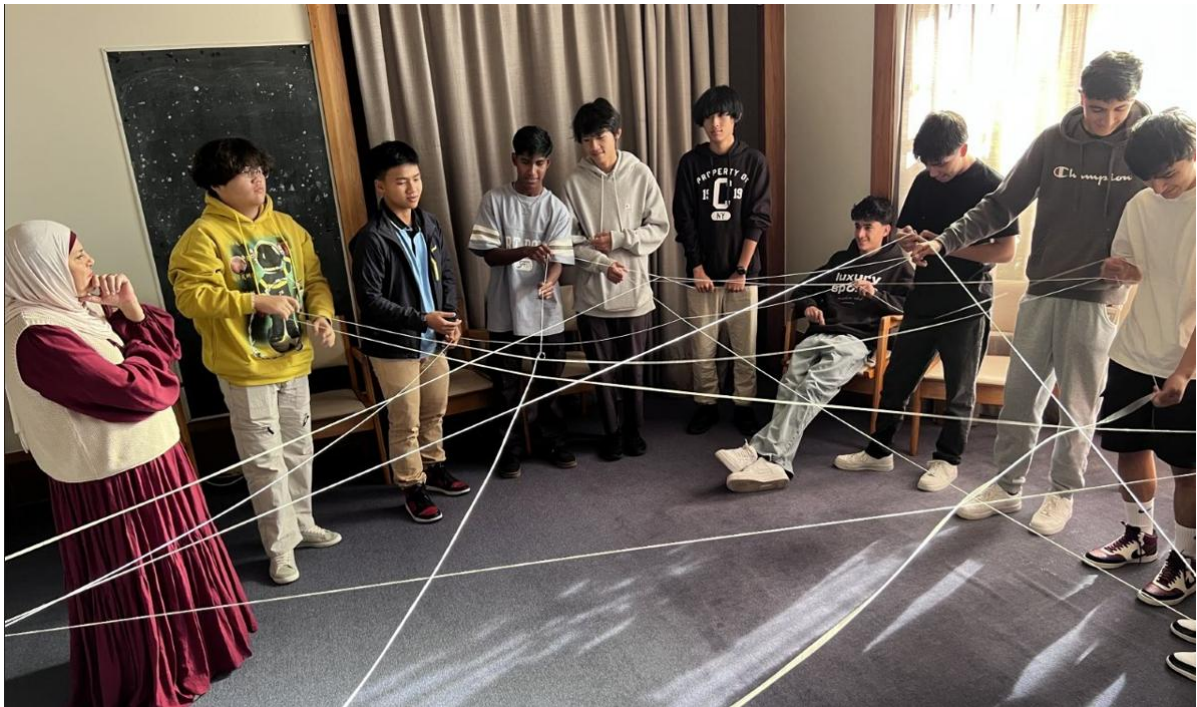
ONLINE WORKSHOPS

We continue to offer open public workshops online from time to time. These sessions are an important way to reach people in small centres around the country, or those who do not have the opportunity to join workshops in person.

WORKING WITH STUDENTS & TEACHERS

WORKSHOPS WITH YOUTH

We are running a small but growing number of workshops for young people, particularly in the Waikato where we have worked with Shama and ROC Trust to offer workshops for Youth. We are also pleased to report that the workshop with youth from Shama, led to a number of participants signing up for facilitator training to be able to run these workshops with their peers.

WORKSHOPS WITH STUDENTS

Another area of our work that we really enjoy is working with students at secondary and tertiary level, where we are invited to contribute to other courses of study such as the Bachelor of Social Practice programme at Unitec.

In Waikato, Hamilton Boys High Manaaki Multicultural Centre invited us to run after-school learning for their boys from immigrant and former refugee backgrounds.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FOR TEACHERS

One key area of our work is training other educators, including upskilling teachers from schools, and organisations that support teachers. This is some of our most important work, as each individual teacher can then pass on the learning to many students.

Teachers really appreciate our interactive workshop activities and find creative ways to adapt them for use with their students of different year levels and subjects.

Some of our clients from the education sector this year included Waiheke and Te Huruhi Primary Schools, and TESOL Teachers at Waikato University.

FACILATOR TRAINING IN WHĀINGAROA

PARTNERING WITH RAGLAN NATURALLY & TOITŪ WHĀINGAROA

Our 10-year long relationship with Raglan Naturally has developed into a three-way partnership with this group and a local tangata whenua initiative called Toitū Whāingaroa.

This led to a request from the Whāingaroa /Raglan groups to Tangata Tiriti for a joint facilitator training run over March, April and May 2025. The training was funded by DIA Community-Led Development, and trained 18 trainees from Hamilton and Raglan.

The trainees learned to deliver both Tangata Tiriti and Toitū Whāingaroa activities. The trainee facilitators are now available to all three partner groups. They call their programme 'Tiriti Activation' in communities and schools.

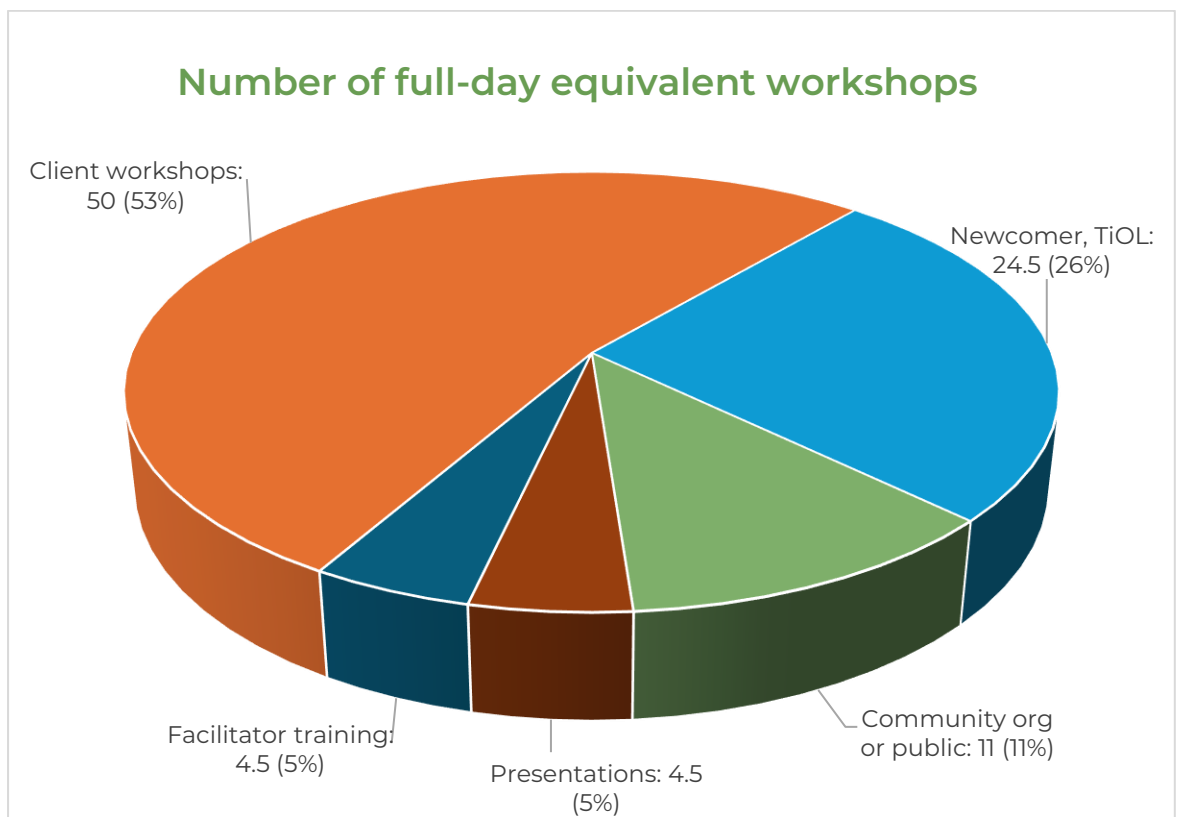
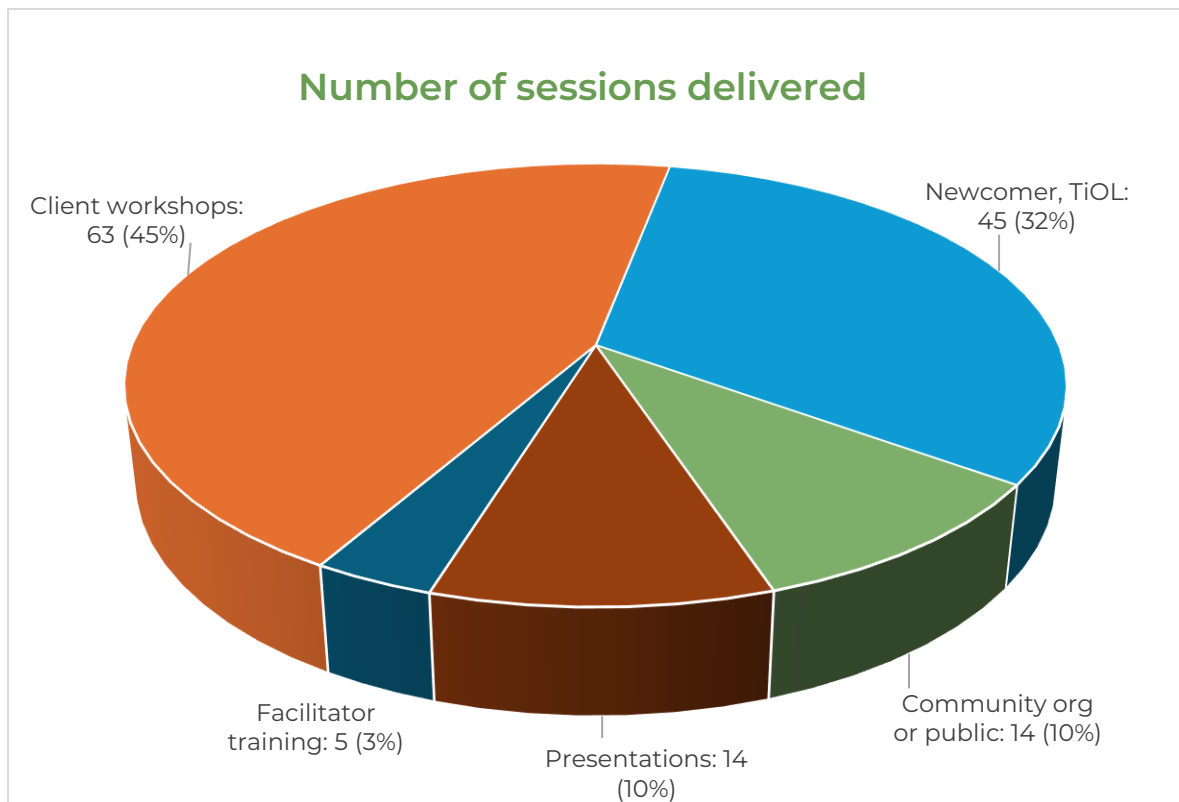
The number of workshops delivered has levelled out this year, with just a small increase in the number of sessions delivered overall.

WAITANGI DAY OUTREACH

WAITANGI DAY IN FOUR PLACES AT ONCE

Waitangi Day this year was our busiest yet, with commitments in four different locations on 6 Feb. We ran stalls at Waitangi, on Auckland's North Shore, in Manukau and at Waikato Museum. In all of these places, our team members gave out Te Tiriti o Waitangi resources and were easy to spot in their new green tees. We also supplied the Tiriti in our Language resources and posters to Waitangi Day stalls in Wellington and Christchurch.

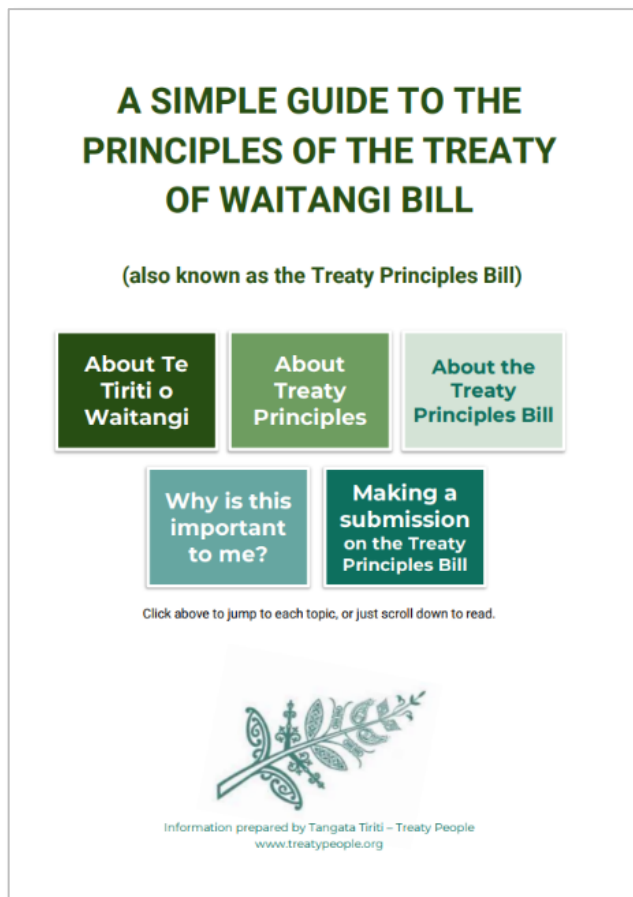


THE TREATY PRINCIPLES BILL & DEMAND PUBLIC INFORMANTION

CREATION OF 'A SIMPLE GUIDE'

With changes to legislation dominating the media last year, we received requests from our facilitators for simple information to help them answer questions from their communities about the Treaty Principles Bill. In response, we put together A Simple Guide to the Treaty Principles Bill. The guide was well-received and shared widely across social media. It was also translated into Arabic, Spanish and adapted by ASTR for Mandarin-speakers.

The various communities that we work with were keen to understand the debate and be equipped to decide their position on current Te Tiriti issues.

GIVING PRESENTATIONS ON TE TIRITI

From mid-2024, our facilitators were asked to participate in a number of public discussions, seminars and panels as communities sought to understand the Treaty Principles Bill and how best to take steps to support Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

The topics of other presentations varied including: presenting about our work (at the Ako Ararau Expo and NZSTI Conference), institutional racism in education (with Te Whai Toi Tangata), demonstrating our activities for educators (Waikato TESOL teachers) and giving an introduction to te reo pronunciation (with Red Cross facilitators).

In a more unusual example, we gave a webinar about the meaning of Waitangi Day for an Australian business with staff joining from Australia, Singapore and New Zealand.

OUR VISION

Tangata Tiriti - Treaty People is a civic education programme on Te Tiriti o Waitangi - The Treaty of Waitangi. Its key aim is to improve the understanding of Te Tiriti o Waitangi amongst different communities in New Zealand, so that all Tangata Tiriti will

- feel they belong to the Treaty relationship
- be well-informed to participate in public discussion and debate about Te Tiriti o Waitangi in Aotearoa today.
- feel prepared to build relationships with Tangata Whenua.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

1. To provide simple, accurate and up-to-date information about Te Tiriti o Waitangi in plain English for all Tangata Tiriti, including for speakers of languages other than English.
2. To develop and disseminate appropriate educational resources and processes that are inclusive and accessible in collaboration with target communities.
3. To hold workshops to promote understanding of Te Tiriti and of colonisation as it occurred in Aotearoa / New Zealand.
4. To train facilitators to work with their own communities and organisations.
5. To facilitate relationships between Tangata Tiriti and Tangata Whenua based on understanding the agreements in Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

STRUCTURE

Tangata Tiriti - Treaty People is an incorporated society with charitable status. Our organisation is governed by a voluntary committee, with an advisory group for the Tiriti in our Language programme's translation work.

We contract coordinators, facilitators and casual staff to carry out the work of the organisation.
